Below is the proposed By-Law & Standing Rule changes that will be voted on at April's Council meeting. Please review with your chapter members and make sure you Council Reps, know the way your chapter wishes to vote. If you have any questions feel free to contact me.

Section 2 First Vice-President/President Elect

He/She shall be Membership Director. He/She shall select her/his own committee and assist Chapter Vice-Presidents. He/She shall work in close cooperation with the President, accept such duties as are assigned to her/him by the President and preside at meetings in the absence of the President. He/She shall be Chairman of an annual event honoring pledges and reaffiliating members. He/She shall be responsible for the administration of the Gladys Bagley Schaefer Outstanding Pledge Award, to be presented during Convention. The Arizona Council shall sponsor one representative to the International Council Leadership Conference. This representative shall be the First Vice President/President Elect or a representative selected by the Executive Board. An amount of money shall be allotted to pay the representative's registration fee and transportation at the least expensive air rate available, excluding First Class.

Proposed Change

Section 2 First Vice-President/President Elect

He/She shall be Membership Director. He/She shall select her/his own committee and assist Chapter Vice-Presidents. He/She shall work in close cooperation with the President, accept such duties as are assigned to her/him by the President and preside at meetings in the absence of the President. He/She shall be Chairman of an annual event in an area centrally located for to honor all pledges and reaffiliating members, if interest dictates, he/she shall be responsible for the administration of the Gladys Bagley Schaefer Outstanding Pledge Award to be presented at the Preferential event. The Arizona Council shall sponsor one representative to the International Council Leadership Conference. This representative shall be the first Vice President/President Elect or a representative selected by the Executive Board. An amount of money shall be allotted to pay the representative's registration fee and transportation at the least expensive air rate available, excluding First Class.

Reason

- Feel we should ensure members have a central location convenient to all with which to honor new members and re-affiliates and not necessarily the location of the First Vice President.
- Do not want the First Vice President to be held to presenting the Gladys Bagley Schaefer Award if there is no shown interest from Chapters.
- By moving the presentation of the Gladys Bagley Schaefer award to the Preferential event it allows more Chapter members to attend and possibly invite additional guests to celebrate the pledge.

So now I am really interested in Culvers and keep the research going until I found the most amazing community stories: a local town airman from the 115 th Flight Wing of the Wisconsin Air National Guard recently returned home from a 4 month deployment in South Korea. Team Culver in Madison, Wisconsin, served 500 Air National Guard members/families at a holiday party with scoops of Fresh Frozen Custard. "Know that the community is there to support, it just makes our jobs and what we do every day better" Major Ripperger, 115 Flight Wing. The Team Members also provide Santa Claus, balloons and ornaments.

Wonderful things happened in Black Hawk County Court House in Waterloo, Iowa thanks to the local Culvers. This city holds an event where multiple adoptions are finalized near Thanksgiving and National Adoption Day. The Team Members provided food/gifts because the Chief Justice requires all families celebrate with ice cream. This program was in jeopardy due to funding. "We're seeing lots of smiles; all the way from kids to the adults. You can feel the energy in the room." - Jake Kendall Besides free scoops of Fresh Frozen Custard, the 23 adopted children received \$2000 gift cards.

Now when the Beta Gammas decide to celebrate their 70th year, I hope we choose Culvers!!!!!




