A Small Gesture – Anonymous

I put my carry-on in the luggage compartment and sat down in my assigned seat. It was going to be a long flight. 'I'm glad I have a good book to read. Perhaps I will get a short nap,' I thought.

Just before take-off, a line of soldiers came down the aisle and filled all the vacant seats, totally surrounding me. I decided to start a conversation. "Where are you headed?" I asked the soldier seated nearest to me.

"Great Lakes Air Base. We'll be there for two weeks for special training, and then we're being deployed to Iraq," he answered.

After flying for about an hour, an announcement was made that sack lunches were available for five dollars. It would be several hours before we reached Chicago, and I quickly decided a lunch would help pass the time.

As I reached for my wallet, I overheard the soldier ask his buddy if he planned to buy lunch. "No, that seems like a lot of money for just a sack lunch. Probably wouldn't be worth five bucks. I'll wait till we get to Chicago."

His friend agreed.

I looked around at the other soldiers. None were buying lunch. I walked to the back of the plane and handed the flight attendant a fifty dollar bill. "Take a lunch to all those soldiers." She grabbed my arms and squeezed tightly. Her eyes wet with tears, she thanked me. "My son was a soldier in Iraq... it's almost like you are doing it for him." Picking up ten sacks, she headed up the aisle to where the soldiers were seated. She stopped at my seat and asked, "Which do you like best - beef or chicken?" "Chicken," I replied, wondering why she asked.

She turned and went to the front of plane, returning a minute later with a dinner plate from first class. "This is your thanks."

After we finished eating, I went again to the back of the plane, heading for the rest room. A man stopped me.

"I saw what you did. I want to be part of it. Here, take this." He handed me twenty-five dollars.

Soon after I returned to my seat, I saw the Flight Captain coming down the aisle, looking at the aisle numbers as he walked, I hoped he was not looking for me, but noticed he was looking at the numbers only on my side of the plane. When he got to my row he stopped, smiled, held out his hand, and said, "I want to shake your hand."

Quickly unfastening my seat belt I stood and took the Captain's hand. With a booming voice he said, "I was a soldier and I was a military pilot. Once, someone bought me a lunch. It was an act of kindness I never forgot." I was embarrassed when applause was heard from all of the passengers.

Later I walked to the front of the plane so I could stretch my legs. A man who was seated about six rows in front of me reached out his hand, wanting to shake mine. He left another twenty-five dollars in my palm.

When we landed in Chicago, I gathered my belongings and started to deplane. Waiting just inside the airplane door was a man who stopped me, put something in my shirt pocket, turned, and walked away without saying a word. Another twenty-five dollars! Upon entering the terminal, I saw the soldiers gathering for their trip to the base. I walked over to them and handed them seventy-five dollars. "It will take you some time to reach the base. It will be about time for a sandwich. God Bless You."

Ten young men left that flight feeling the love and respect of their fellow travelers. As I walked briskly to my car, I whispered a prayer for their safe return. These soldiers were

giving their all for our country. I could only give them a couple of meals. It seemed so little.

A U.S. veteran is someone who, at one point in his life wrote a blank check made payable to "The United States of America for an amount of 'up to and including my life." That is Honor... and there are way too many people in this country who no longer understand it.

Whenever I think about the men and women serving in the Military, I am reminded of the late 60's early 70's and the Vietnam War. Do you remember those silver POW/MIA bracelets you could purchase to be reminded of the serviceman who was either missing in action or being held as a prisoner. I had a POW Bracelet that I wore every day. At the end of the war, I was very lucky that my serviceman came home to his family. Some were not so lucky and to this day are still missing. May is the month we celebrate Memorial Day. Let us all take a minute to thank all of the Servicemen and Women we encounter for their unselfish service to our country so that we can sleep safe at night and to remember those who did not make it home to their loved ones. Let me start. To all of you who served our Country, from a grateful citizen THANK YOU.

Treasurer

Hello, All,

It's been a good year working on the State Board as treasurer this year. I've learned a lot and had a wonderful time serving on the board.

One of the tasks that I was working on through the past few months was to find out if using a Credit Union, as opposed to our traditional bank would be a viable option. So, I've done a little research.

I reviewed 15 credit unions. I looked for answers to several questions when reviewing each credit union.

1. Do they service Small Business/ Nonprofit organizations? Surprisingly, some do, some don't.

2. Are they easily accessible – by location to all of our chapters and to the potential next state treasurer? Most credit unions are affiliated with a Co-Op Network that allows for going to various credit unions to do banking transactions – such as making deposits, cashing checks, using ATM's, basic stuff- without being charged a fee to use the services of credit unions other than the one your account is with.

- 3. What are the banking or membership fees?
- 4. Is there a minimum balance requirement?
- 5. What are the membership requirements?
- 6. Is there an interest earning checking account, and what would be the return?
- 7. What is the interest on savings accounts?
- 8. What is the charge for checks written and deposits made?

I found it quite interesting to see how they all vary. Below is a list of the top runners that either don't have membership requirements, or that we meet the requirements for and have attached it for your use. If you have been thinking about changing your ESA Chapter account to another bank, I encourage you to check out credit unions. I hope you find this helpful.

Chapters and Members of the Arizona Council,

Hello everyone. I hope this finds you all doing exceptionally well and enjoying the sort of spring/early summer weather. I know that some of you will think I'm a bad penny but I feel very strongly about this and I need to speak with you directly.

For the last 2 years, a Bylaw change has been submitted to the Council to consolidate the duties of the State Parliamentarian with the Jr. Past President. Both years it has failed because people were sure we would be eliminating competition for offices and discouraging others from running. However, we are now in our 3rd year of being short candidates to fill the open seats on our Executive Board.

No one likes to admit that we are getting older, things are costing more and there are increasing demands for our time. However it is our reality and with that reality comes the truth that we don't have people steping up to run for our Board. I did the math and in the last 18 years, 12 chapters have supplied us with all of our Executive Board members and State Presidents. That includes the 2 chapters that gave us a member for a one and done position. It is time to do the right thing for the Council and consolidate these offices. The Jr. Past President is the perfect person to cover Parliamentarian because he or she has just been President. He or she is fully versed in the running of the Council and the parliamentary procedure that we use in meetings as well as what our Bylaws and Standing Rules cover.

For all of these reasons, I am again submitting the Bylaw Change to consolidate these offices and provide us with a better chance at filling the positions we need to elect for our Board.

I am in compliance with the 30 day rule as it is being distributed today, April 15th and our Convention is June 1-3, 2018. If you have questions or would like to talk with me about this issue, please feel free to contact me at 623-521-0941.

ARTICLE IV ORGANIZATION Section 3 Officers Currently Reads:

The officers of the Arizona Council shall be President, First Vice-President/President Elect, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Parliamentarian, and Junior Past President. These officers shall be installed during the convention.

Proposed change to read:

The officers of the Arizona Council shall be President, First Vice-President/President Elect, Second Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and Junior Past President/Parliamentarian. These officers shall be installed during the convention.

Rationale:

It has become increasingly difficult to find members who wish to serve on the Executive Board. In recent past years it was necessary for the President to appoint someone to serve as the Parliamentarian. Having the Jr. Past President serve as Parliamentarian is a logical choice, as they are aware of the business of the Council and has the experience to assist the Executive board with parliamentary procedure.

If the above change is approved, the following changes would also need to be made.

ARTICLE V DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 7 Parliamentarian

The Parliamentarian shall serve as Chairman of the Bylaws Committee and advise the President on questions pertaining to parliamentary procedure. He/She shall maintain and keep a permanent record of all Bylaw and Standing Rule changes.

Proposed change: Remove Rationale:

There is no longer an individual Parliamentarian position.

Section 8 Junior Past President

He/She shall be Disaster Fund Chairman.

Proposed change to read:

Section 7 Junior Past President/Parliamentarian

He/She shall be Disaster Fund Chairman.

He/She shall serve as Chairman of the Bylaws Committee and advise the President on questions pertaining to parliamentary procedure. He/She shall maintain and keep a permanent record of all Bylaw and Standing Rule changes.

Rationale:

Removing Section 7 requires Section 8 to become Section 7. Combining the office of Parliamentarian with the office of Jr. Past President requires to the duties of the offices to also be combined.

May Day

May Day is a public holiday usually celebrated on 1 May. It is an ancient northern hemisphere spring festival and a traditional spring holiday in many cultures. Dances, singing, and cake are usually part of the festivities. In the late 19th century,



May Day was chosen as the date for International Workers' Day by the Socialists and Communists of the Second International to commemorate the Haymarket affair in Chicago. International Workers' Day can also be referred to as "May Day", but it is a different celebration from the traditional May Day.



May Day was also celebrated by some early European settlers of the American continent. In some parts of the United States, May baskets are made. These are small baskets usually filled with flowers or treats and left at someone's doorstep. The giver rings the bell and runs away.

May Day celebrations were common at women's colleges and academic institutions in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century, a tradition that continues at Bryn Mawr College and Brenau University to this day.





In Minneapolis, the May Day Parade and Festival is presented annually by In the Heart of the Beast Puppet and Mask Theatre on the first Sunday in May, and draws around 50,000 people to Powderhorn Park.

In Hawaii, May Day is also known as Lei Day, and it is normally set aside as a day to celebrate island culture in general and the culture of the Native Hawaiians in particular. Invented by poet and local newspaper columnist Don Blanding, the first Lei Day was celebrated on 1 May 1927 in Honolulu. Leonard "Red" and Ruth Hawk composed "May Day Is Lei Day in Hawai'i," the traditional holiday song.

The History of Memorial Day

Originally called Decoration Day, from the early tradition of decorating graves with flowers, wreaths and flags, Memorial Day is a day for remembrance of those who have died in service to our country. It was first widely observed on May 30, 1868 to commemorate the sacrifices of Civil War soldiers, by proclamation of Gen. John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of former Union sailors and soldiers.

During that first national celebration, former Union Gen. and sitting Ohio Congressman James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, after which 5,000 participants helped to decorate the graves of the more than 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers who were buried there.

This event was inspired by local observances of the day that had taken place in several towns throughout America in the three years after the Civil War. In 1873, New York was the first state to designate Memorial Day as a legal holiday. By the late 1800s, many more cities and communities observed Memorial Day, and several states had declared it a legal holiday. After World War I, it became an occasion for honoring those who died in all of America's wars and was then more widely established as a national holiday throughout the United States.

When Is Memorial Day?

In 1950, Congress passed a resolution requesting that the President issue a proclamation calling on Americans to observe Memorial Day as a day of prayer for permanent peace.

In 1968, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, which established Memorial Day as the last Monday in May, in order to create a three-day weekend for federal employees. But Memorial Day didn't actually become an official federal holiday until 1971. In 1971, Congress passed the Uniform Monday Holiday Act and established that Memorial Day was to be celebrated on the last Monday of May.

Memorial Day is celebrated at Arlington National Cemetery each year with a ceremony in which a small American flag is placed on each grave. Traditionally, the President or Vice President lays a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. About 5,000 people attend the ceremony annually.



To ensure the sacrifices of America's fallen heroes are never forgotten, in December 2000, the U.S. Congress passed and President Clinton signed into law "The National Moment of Remembrance Act," P.L. 106-579, creating the White House Commission on the National Moment of Remembrance. The commission's charter is to "encourage the people of the United States to give something back to their country, which provides them so much freedom and opportunity" by encouraging and coordinating commemorations in the United States of Memorial Day and the National Moment of Remembrance.

The National Moment of Remembrance encourages all Americans to pause wherever they are at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day for a minute of silence to remember and honor those who have died in service to the nation. As Moment of Remembrance founder Carmella LaSpada states: "It's a way we can all help put the memorial back in Memorial Day."

Cities across the country host Memorial Day parades, but some of the largest parades take place in Chicago, New York. Washington D.C. parade has an audience exceeding 250,000, and includes marching bands, active duty and retired military units, youth groups, veterans, and floats heading down Constitution Avenue.

The President requests that all governors of the United States and the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico direct the flag to be flown at half-staff until noon on Memorial Day on all buildings, grounds, and naval vessels. U.S. citizens are asked to display the flag at half-staff from their homes before noon, as well.




