It was reported at the IC Convention this year that ESA gave out over \$93,000 dollars in Disaster Fund assistance to our sisters and brothers. We had to borrow \$50,000 from one of our CD's to cover the cost of the claims. I know even though we have what seems to be an ample amount of money in the Disaster Fund account and CD's, if we continue on the same track as we did last year, we will run out of money in short order.

Each month I will be featuring a hero story. We hear and recognize heroes through the media nowadays. My goal is the little hidden gem that you run across that is interesting, but not so well known in this media age. Some years ago, I purchased two books, author signed, and presented to two of my chapter sisters. It is a compilation of 200 interviews with American military nurses of the Army, Army AF and Navy, who served in theaters of WWII. Stories of horrific hardships faced with courage, tenacity and humor.

OUR SEPTEMBER HERO

Ellen joined the army in 1942 and her first assignment was to Fort Huachuca, AZ where everything was segregated. The original hospital took only white patients, with white doctors and nurses. The African-American nurses and doctors were in a new section caring for black patients only. In 1943, Ellen and African-American nurses from Fort Bragg, NC and Tuskegee Air Base, AL were sent overseas. They sailed in a convoy of ships from New Jersey that took thirty days to get to Liberia. At one point, every ship in the convoy stopped dead in the water because enemy

submarines were detected in the area. At the coast of North Africa, the ship sat off the coast of Casablanca a week waiting for an escort to Liberia. Their assignment was mainly caring for the soldiers stationed at the airfield who had malaria. Troops were there to protect the American rubber plantations. Living was crude; barracks were infested with rats and lizards. Rafters had lizards crawling on them, and frequently, a monkey. Rainy season, raincoats were put over the beds nets to keep dry. The community latrine, a bench with five holes in it, was in a

separate area. Nighttime required an escort for safety. The hospital had a surgical and psychiatric unit, others were medical. They took care of black and white patients. Malaria was the main illness and patients were very ill. After about ten months the nurses returned to the States as several were getting sick. Most were disappointed that they didn't get front-line duty, but later realized how important it was for them to be there.
