HOPE for Heroes, Chairs



The Medal of Honor is the United States of America's highest and most prestigious personal military decoration that may be awarded to recognize United States military service members who have distinguished themselves by acts of valor.

The Medal of Honor was first awarded March 25, 1863 and the last Medal of Honor was awarded on October 30, 2019.

On July 12, 1862 President Abraham Lincoln signed a law providing for the award of medals to any personnel who "distinguish themselves by their gallantry in action" and the first Medal

of Honor five-point bronze stars coated in copper were awarded to six Civil War Union Volunteers.

The Hope for Heroes Chair-persons (Paula Fisher, Janice Shaproski and Kendra Sabol) for the ESA Arizona Council would like to introduce the Medal of Honor recipients for the State of Arizona.

William Alchesay was a Sergeant of the Indian Scouts. He was a White Mountain Apache leader born in 1853 and died in 1928. He served with General Crook and he was widely respected and made several trips to confer with the President of the United States. The Medal of Honor was issued April 12, 1875 for gallant conduct during campaigns and engagements with the Apaches during the years 1872-1873.

Oscar Austin (1948-1969) Private First Class, USMC, Company E, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 1st Marine Division. Oscar entered service in Phoenix, Arizona. Cited for action on February 23, 1969 in the Republic of Vietnam. To save the life of a wounded fellow Marine, PFC Austin first threw himself between the Marine and a grenade, absorbing the effects of its detonation. He then placed himself between the Marine and an enemy soldier and was mortally wounded.

Nicky Bacon, Staff Sergeant, U.S. Army, Company B, 4th Battalion, 21st Infantry, 11th Infantry Brigade, American Division, entered service in Phoenix, Arizona. He was cited for action on August 26, 1968 in the Republic of Vietnam. In the face of

intense enemy fire, squad leader Bacon took charge of two decimated platoons, personally destroying a hostile bunker with grenades, an enemy gun crew in a single-handed effort, and an antitank weapon. Despite heavy fire, he directed fire into the enemy position from the exposed deck of a tank until several wounded comrades were evacuated.

William Croft Barnes (1858-1936) was born in San Francisco, California. He was active duty U.S. Army Signal Corps, 1879-1883. Barnes risked his life frequently in enemy areas, repairing telegraph lines and carrying dispatches. In a skirmish on September 11, 1881, Barnes displayed bravery in action against the Apaches. He was awarded the Medal of Honor in 1882. Starting in 1883, Sergeant Barnes became a cattleman in Holbrook, Arizona; served in Arizona's Territorial Legislative Assembly, accomplishing the creation of Navajo County; and wrote many books, including Arizona Place Names, still in print today. Starting in 1907 with the US Forest Service, Barnes developed and preserved grazing lands in the State; retiring from government service in 1930 in Phoenix. The Barnes Hall Army Reserve Training Center, Oak Street, Phoenix; Barnes Butte, Phoenix; and the Barnes Field House at Fort Huachuca; are named in Barnes' honor.

Blanquet had rank and organization with the Indian Scouts. He was born in Arizona. April 12, 1875 he received the Medal of Honor for gallant conduct during campaigns and engagements with Apaches.

Benjamin Brown, (1859-1910) was born in Spotsylvania County, Virginia. A Sergeant in th 24th Infantry Regiment assigned to southeastern Arizona Territory in 1889. On May 11 as part of a 12 man detail of "Buffalo Soldiers" escorting U.S. Army paymaster Major Joseph W. Wham, the formation was ambushed by a gang of highwaymen near the Pima Settlement. During the ensuing fight, which he fought alone in an exposed position, Brown suffered bullet wounds to the abdomen and both arms, but continued to fight until the bandits withdrew. Sergeant Brown was one of the two "Buffalo Soldiers" awarded the Medal of Honor for this action.

Trustrim Connell (1844-1937) was born in Lancaster, Pennsylvania. He served with distinction as an infantryman during the Civil War. Connell was awarded the Medal of Honor in 1865 for heroism and leadership resulting in the capture of a key Confederate flag and assets during the battle at Sailor's Creek, Virginia. A Western and Arizona pioneer, during the 1880's, he was placed in charge of Indian territory, and all Wells Fargo Company business in Indian territory. The

Connell family relocated to Phoenix in 1898. After statehood, Connell was employed by the American Railway Express Company, until his retirement in 1925. He maintained close ties to the State's military establishment and at the time of his demise, was the only Arizonan reportedly wearing the Congressional Medal of Honor.



HOPE FOR HEROES Presents OPERATION PAPERBACK

This 501(c)(3) organization is incorporated in Pennsylvania since 1999. At this time, the members began sending the first shipment of paperbacks to Kuwait and Saudi Arabia. They expanded the organization to include volunteers. They have currently shipped 2.9 million books to over 30 locations overseas.

The 19,000 volunteers from all 50 states ship 15,000 books per month. They are also being sent to veteran's organizations in the states. As volunteers, WE NEED YOUR BOOKS! As a volunteer, we request names of those serving overseas and those veteran organization in the states that want books. We have an opportunity to make a selection for sending and complying with their genre requests. These books are boxed up and sent Media Mail Rate. These books are also sent with our monetary donation.

WE NEED YOUR HARDBACK BOOKS AND PAPERBACK BOOKS AND A LITLE CASH!!!

Please keep your books for us until we can actually get them. If you have an opportunity to be in the Phoenix, Mesa or Cave Creek area we can make arrangements to get them.

When we get your books we would appreciate a LITTLE CASH to defer the cost of shipping. This is a wonderful way for you to get rid of all those books you have been reading or stashed and some of the coins and dollars you have not been able to spend to support our Hope for Heroes project.

NOTES OF THANKS

Thanks for the books. We received 6 boxes that have already ben shelved and some have disappeared that quick. We appreciate your support.

I am currently a forward deployed sailor out in Guam. With the recent COVID-19 outbreak, we were sequestered in place for several months; unable to go home. I received several books that kept me busy during those months. Thank You!!! Your program has helped several of my shipmates through this rough period as well. Stay safe.

NEWS FROM SOUTHWEST HUMAN DEVELOPMENT - EASTERSEALS - PHOENIX

Greetings from Phoenix! So much is not happening because of the Covid-19 pandemic. The usual events have been cancelled for the rest of this year and iffy for the 2021 year. One good thing to report is the March 30 WALK WITH ME went virtual and raised \$161,000 for the children with disabilities. Awesome!

The Coronavirus crisis has changed the child's social interaction with families staying home and social distancing. Young children don't yet have the social and technical skills to adapt like adults do by using the phone and computer. The use of the technological interaction between children has to be set up by a parent so they can visit with friends and have virtual play dates. Regardless, there are behavioral challenges when a preschool child loses contact with their playmates. Extra attention from a parent is helpful and consultation from a SWHD counselor or child development specialist is available.

Any help chapters can offer will be appreciated in this difficult time.

Southwest Human Development has set up several programs to support the families in need. Some programs are:

"GRAB & GO" MEALS AND BASIC NEEDS SUPPLIES - Complements the Family Assistance Fund by providing free meals and baby supplies on week-day mornings on a first-come, first-served basis. Thousands of meals have been served.

COVID-19 FUND FOR EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS - Many child care centers had to close and only 20% remained open. Through these two programs, SWHD was able to fund 38 financial requests totaling more than \$171,000.

SWHD's BIRTH TO FIVE HELPLINE remains open to help parents and caregivers. The help line is 877-705-5437, Monday - Friday, 8 to 8. Each child is different and the counselors can help them decide what activities the children can participate in to help with their anxieties in this difficult time.

The GINGERBREAD KIDS HOLIDAY GIFT DRIVE can help make a kid's wish come true. The 2019 drive gathered more than 950 gifts through community partners. By November 13 you will receive a personalized Gingerbread Kid paper ornament with a child's name and a list of favorite things desired. The gifts should be ready for pick-up/delivery no later than December 11 so they can be delivered to the child before Christmas.

New school supplies were needed to fill 500 back to school backpacks. People ordered items online and had them delivered to Aviva since they are restricting access to the building.

The only thing that ESA members can really do at this time is to donate funds online or purchase Christmas toys and have them delivered to Aviva Children's Services 153 S. Plumer Ave. Tucson, AZ 85719. We can only hope that Christmas is not cancelled this year.

My final wish is that since we cannot meet as of yet, that all of ESA is keeping hope, laughter and dreams of better times alive. Hopefully, we will see each other soon and are grateful that so few of us have gotten the virus. Beta Kappa is working on an "out of the box" way to hold the November council meeting.
