Chaplain's Corner

Greetings All,

Recently I came across some writing by Lynne Twist. She is a co-founder of The Pachamama Alliance, and founder of The Soul of Money Institute. She has dedicated herself to alleviating poverty and hunger and supporting social justice and environmental sustainability. Brother David Steindl-Rast is mentioned below. He is an American Catholic Benedictine monk, author, and lecturer. He is committed to interfaith dialogue and has dealt with the interaction between spirituality and science.

Lynne Twist asked Brother David Steindl-Rast, "What is the difference between 'gratitude' and 'gratefulness'?" He proceeded to tell her the story of the tree with two branches. There are two branches of Gratitude. One is Gratefulness, and the other is Thanksgiving.

The Gratefulness branch is when the Bowl of Life is so full that it's almost overflowing, but not quite. So full that it's almost bowed at the top, but not quite dribbling over the edges. And, that is the experience of the Great Fullness of Life. And when you're in the Great Fullness of Life, you're one with God, you're one with the Universe, there is no "other". And that is so Full Filling, that the Bowl of Life gives way and to overflow at last, which flows you directly over to the second branch, that of Thanksgiving.

When you're in the space of Thanksgiving, the Bowl of Life is absolutely overflowing. You're so grateful that there is an "other" because all you want to do is contribute and serve and share and give and make a difference. And that is so Full Filling, that it puts you right back onto the other branch where you experience the Great Fullness of Life, where you're one with God and there is no "other".

May your lives be filled with both gratitude and gratefulness.

Medal of Honor

SURPRIZING FACTS!!!



Only one woman has received the Medal of Honor, and the award was temporarily rescinded. The woman was a physician who supported feminist and abolitionist causes – Mary Edwards Walker. She volunteered with the Union Army at the outbreak of the Civil War. She initially worked as a nurse before becoming the Army's first female surgeon. She crossed enemy lines to treat civilians. She may have been serving as a spy when she was captured by Confederate troops in 1864. Mary was later released as part of a prisoner exchange and returned to duty. November 11, 1865

President Andrew Jackson presented her with the Medal of Honor. In 1917 the Army changed the criteria for eligibility and revoked the awards of 911 non-combatants, including Walker. She still wore her Medal of Honor until her death two years later. An Army board restored her Medal of Honor in 1977 – praising her distinguished gallantry, self-sacrifice, patriotism, dedication and unselfish loyalty to her country, despite apparent discrimination of her sex.

Bernard John Dowling Irwin (1830-1917) was born in County Roscommon, Ireland. An assistant surgeon in the regular Army in the Arizona Territory 1856-1861, Lt. Irwin saw extensive field duty against hostile Apaches and Navajos. From his post at Fort Buchanan during the winter of 1861, he led a small detachment of soldiers through treacherous weather on a 100 mile journey to rescue a force which had been surrounded by Cochise's 500 Apache warriors. At the site of the siege, he deftly deployed his soldiers so convincingly that the Apaches, suspecting a much larger force, hurriedly fled into the mountains. This single engagement led to the degradation of hostile Indian activities in the Southwest. Although established in 1861, Lt. Irwin received the Medal of Honor in 1894.

Jim held the rank and organization of Sergeant, Indian Scouts. Place and date: winter of 1871-1873. He was born in the Arizona Territory. The Medal of Honor was issued April 12, 1875. The citation was for gallant conduct during campaigns and engagements with Apaches.

Jose Jimenez (1946-1969) Lance Corporal, USMC, Company K, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines, 1st Marine Division was born in Mexico City on March 20, 1946. He

entered his service at Phoenix, Arizona. He was cited for action on August 28, 1969 in the Republic of Vietnam. Facing a heavy attack from well-entrenched enemy soldiers, Lance Corporal Jimenez plunged forward toward the enemy positions; destroying several enemy personnel and an antiaircraft weapon. Advancing to within ten feet of vicious enemy fire, he destroyed the position and was continuing forward when he was mortally wounded.

Kelsay was born in Arizona. His rank and organization was Indian Scouts and he served during the winter of 1872-73. His citation was April 12, 1875 for gallant conduct during campaigns and engagements with Apaches.

Kosoha held the rank and organization of Indian Scouts and he served the winter of 1872-73. He was born in Arizona. Date of issue of his citation was April 12, 1875 for gallant conduct during campaigns and engagements with Apaches.

Billy Lauffer (1945-1966) was Private First Class, I+U.S. Army, Company C, 2nd Battalion, 5th Cavalry, 1st Air Cavalry Division. He entered his service in Phoenix, Arizona. He was cited for action on September 21, 1966 in the Republic of Vietnam. Seeing his unit pinned down by intense machinegun crossfire and wounded comrades lying helpless in the beaten zone, Private Lauffer charged the enemy machinegun positions, confusing the enemy and allowing his wounded comrades to be rescued and his unit to gain a more advantageous position. Private Lauffer was fatally wounded during his heroic effort. Submitted by Hope for Heroes Chairs

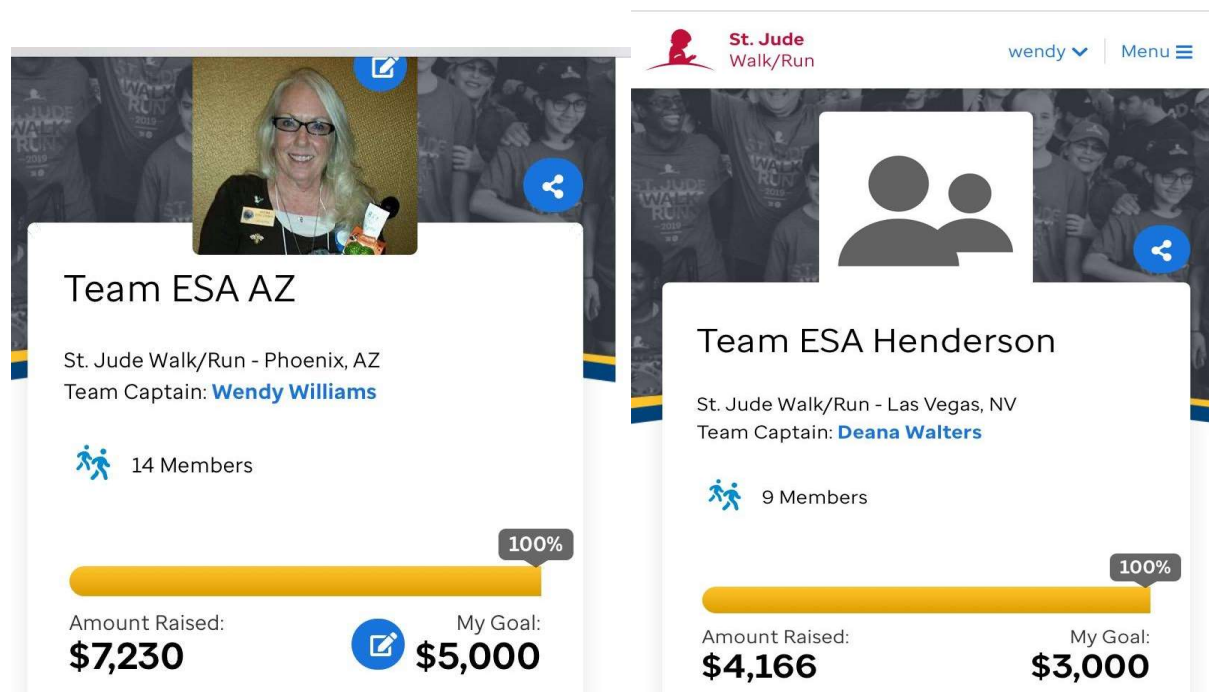
